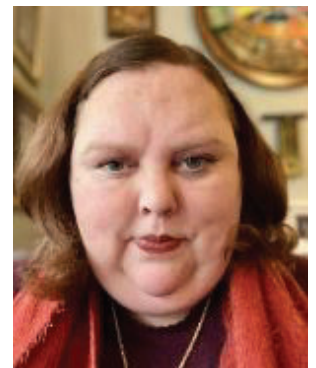

# MEET THE AAUW OMAHA BOARD MEMBERS

## Melody Mundell Vice President for Programming



Hello,

I am Melody Mundell, Vice President for programming in this Omaha branch of AAUW. This is my month to introduce myself and tell you more about who is serving on the board this year and next.

I have lived in Omaha for almost exactly four years, moving here in January of 2018 from Erie, Colorado. I was born in Denver and lived in Colorado all my life until deciding to retire and relocate to Omaha, where my brother has lived for 47 years. Over those years, I visited Omaha many times and thought I would enjoy living here in the same city as my only sibling.

In Colorado, I owned a 14-acre horse farm and operated an equine boarding, training and instructional facility. I taught mostly private lessons to children and adults, took students to horse shows, and traveled extensively to teach, lecture, and judge horse shows around the United States. I initially planned to become a university professor like my brother, completed my university degrees, and spent four years as a T.A. in the English Department at the University of Colorado. The job market did not cooperate with my career plans, but I remained in the teaching profession for most of my life. Following my children through their school years, I worked as a pre-school music director, directed dramatic productions in elementary and junior high school programs, and taught high school English classes, all while developing my business, running the farm, and raising those children.

I am glad to be out of the equestrian business and living a slower, physically easier life in retirement. I continue to teach water aerobics two days a week at the Sarpy YWCA, something I also did in Colorado. I belong to the AAUW evening book discussion group and stay in virtual touch with my Colorado book group of 30+ years. I love being outside and enjoy working in my much smaller "city" vegetable and flower gardens and in the yard, adding to the landscape each year. I traded a 100 year old farmhouse for a 97 year old house here in the Happy Hollow/Dundee neighborhood, and there is always something to work on. Literature, history, architecture, southwestern art and interior design are other interests.

A friend of my brother introduced me to the AAUW group here in Omaha, and I joined in 2018. I hoped to meet people with similar interests and to find ways to serve my community. I joined members in Read Across America at Sherman Elementary school the one year we were able to do that before COVID closed things down and hope to do so again.

In addition, I believe that now is the time to look around us and identify other areas where AAUW Omaha can make a difference for young girls in our community. One idea might be to use some of our funds to develop a scholarship program for young girls in public school who are showing academic promise and an interest in pursuing a university education. The board welcomes your ideas for ways to carry out our mission statement.

Meetings start at 7:00 p.m the first Thursday of the month (online via Zoom)

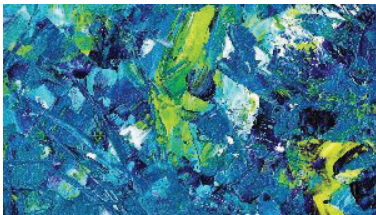
